



In his first full season as the starting quarterback, he took the 49ers to the Super Bowl. The 49ers also have the best running back in the league in Christian McCaffrey who won offensive player of the year.

Aaron Dickhart said "I think the Chiefs will win because their offense is too powerful in the playoffs and Mahomes always performs well in big games". He also said "Mahomes will win the Super Bowl MVP". Aarons final score prediction 33-28. Connor Progar said "The 49ers will win because they are deep in each position". He said "Christian McCafferey will win the Super Bowl MVP". Connors final score prediction was 30-27.

The Chiefs ended up winning the Super Bowl in overtime with a game-winning touchdown thrown to Mecole Hardman. The final score was 25-22 with Patrick Mahomes winning Super Bowl MVP with 333 yards passing and two touchdowns. This is the Chiefs 3rd Super Bowl win in five years. They are officially a dynasty, and Mahomes has already cemented himself as one of the greatest quarterbacks ever at 28 years old. If they can win the Super Bowl next year, they will be the first team in history to win three consecutively.
