



ARP ESSER Health and Safety Plan Guidance & Template

Section 2001(i)(1) of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires each local education agency (LEA) that receives funding under the ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website a *Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan*, hereinafter referred to as a *Health and Safety Plan*.

Based on ARP requirements, 90 percent of ARP ESSER funds will be distributed to school districts and charter schools based on their relative share of Title I-A funding in FY 2020-2021. **Given Federally required timelines, LEAs eligible to apply for and receive this portion of the ARP ESSER funding must submit a Health and Safety Plan that meets ARP Act requirements to the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) by Friday, July 30, 2021, regardless of when the LEA submits its ARP ESSER application.**

Each LEA must create a Health and Safety Plan that addresses how it will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff, and which will serve as local guidelines for all instructional and non-instructional school activities during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. The Health and Safety Plan should be tailored to the unique needs of each LEA and its schools and must take into account public comment related to the development of, and subsequent revisions to, the Health and Safety Plan.

The ARP Act and U.S. Department of Education rules require Health and Safety plans include the following components:

1. How the LEA will, to the greatest extent practicable, implement prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning;
2. How the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services;

3. How the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policy on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC:

- a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;
- b. Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);
- c. Handwashing and respiratory etiquette;
- d. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation;
- e. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with State and local health departments;
- f. Diagnostic and screening testing;
- g. Efforts to provide COVID-19 vaccinations to school communities;
- h. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and
- i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

The LEA's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the LEA's publicly available website by July 30, 2021.* The ARP Act requires LEAs to post their Health and Safety Plans online in a language that parents/caregivers can understand, or, if it is not practicable to provide written translations to an individual with limited English proficiency, be orally translated. The plan also must be provided in an alternative format accessible, upon request, by a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Each LEA will upload in the eGrants system its updated Health and Safety Plan and webpage URL where the plan is located on the LEA's publicly available website.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to review their Health and Safety Plans at least every six months during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. LEAs also must review and update their plans whenever there are significant changes to the CDC recommendations for K-12 schools. Like the development of the plan, all revisions must be informed by community input and reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the LEA's publicly available website.

LEAs may use the template to revise their current Health and Safety Plans to meet ARP requirements and ensure all stakeholders are fully informed of the LEA's plan to safely resume instructional and non-instructional school activities, including in-person learning, for the current school year. An LEA may use a different plan template or format provided it includes all the elements required by the ARP Act, as listed above.

* The July 30 deadline applies only to school districts and charter schools that received federal Title I-A funds in FY 2020-2021 and intend to apply for and receive ARP ESSER funding.

How will the LEA, to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?

Hopewell Area School District (HASD) will continue to review the guidance from the Center for Disease Control (CDC) and Pennsylvania Department of Health (PA DOH) and revise our Health and Safety Plan according to the recommendations of those two entities. Our current protocols align with CDC and PA DOH guidance. The Administration participates in regular county-wide meetings to stay abreast of current guidelines. Throughout the past school year, the Beaver Valley Intermediate Unit hosted weekly Superintendent virtual meetings to provide opportunities to review updated regulations and to collaborate amongst our colleagues. In addition, we have partnered with local health care professionals and rely on their expertise to help navigate the pandemic. Our county-wide nurses have been meeting regularly and have provided valuable resources for all of the school district. The District Administration meets weekly. Updated guidance will be incorporated into our Health and Safety Plan on a regular basis.

1. How will the LEA ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services?

Hopewell Area School District (HASD) will continue to educate students regardless of level of transmission. The District will consider PDE and DOH's recommendations for instructional models when levels of transmission increases with the desire to educate students in person, if safe to do so. Families may choose the educational programming that is best for their child. Families may select face-to-face instruction or online instruction. Approximately 2100 students in grades K-12 are educated by the HASD (This includes students in various placements.) By permitting choice, the district is able to address family educational and health needs.

In the event the district would need to transition to a complete virtual environment, students would utilize their district provided technology device. In addition to curricular materials, staff utilize age-appropriate resources like from the Google Suite, Schoology, Teams, Edgenuity, Compass Learning, and Seesaw to educate our students in a virtual environment.

We surveyed our families to ascertain internet accessibility. Our staff has worked with those without the internet to assist them in finding an appropriate provider. In some instances, hotspots were given to the children. Internet accessibility is also available when a person is in proximity of the district buildings.

To assist students and staff social, emotional, and mental health needs, our guidance counselors and school nurses provide assistance. In addition, the district has a partnership with Family Behavioral Resources (FBR) to offer on-site mental health services to our students. FBR utilizes space within the building and services students on a regular basis. Our district's health care provider, Blue Cross Blue Shield also disseminates information to staff on a regular basis in an effort to provide valuable resources for our mental health.

Food Services, including breakfast and lunch, will continue during face-to-face instruction or prolonged virtual instruction.

a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;

1. The district will comply with PA Department of Health mask mandates.
2. If required, Mask orders will be posted at entrances.
3. Staff will receive training on appropriate wearing of masks at the beginning of year.
4. If required, teachers will train students regarding appropriate use of masks.
5. Signage throughout the building will remind students and staff of the mandate and appropriate wearing of masks, if required.
6. Any employee who is not vaccinated (two weeks) will be required to wear a mask.
7. All students and employees are able to wear a mask, if desired.
8. When Beaver County is in substantial or high rate of transmission based on the CDC transmission levels, facial coverings will be required for students and staff while indoors. After being out of substantial transmission rate for two weeks board may change mask requirement to optional. The District may also require masks in the event we see any negative impact on our schools.

b. Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);

1. Social distancing will be implemented based on CDC recommendations to the greatest extent possible.
2. Miscellaneous furniture may be removed to establish maximum social distancing.
3. Larger classes may be moved to a larger space.
4. Classes may be held outdoors when possible.
5. Teacher and Student desks will all face the same direction, if applicable.
6. Social distancing patterns will be maintained within classrooms and throughout the common areas, i.e. hallways, stairwells, etc. to the greatest extent possible.
7. Signage is established to show traffic flow, repurpose stair wells to be up/down stairs.

Staff and students will practice social distancing by stay at least 6 feet from other people in both indoor and outdoor spaces, to the greatest extent possible. 9. Elementary students may have recess as a classroom (not grade level) at least through the first semester. 10. Partitions will be available for any staff member or student (or by parent request) who desires a partition. 11. Partitions may be used in cafeterias when students are eating without wearing a mask. 12. Faculty rooms will be available for staff to eat who are fully vaccinated.
<p>c. <u>Handwashing and respiratory etiquette:</u></p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All staff will be trained on healthy hygiene practices so they can teach these to students at the start of the school year. 2. Ensure handwashing strategies include washing with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not available and hands are not visibly dirty, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol. 3. CDC – handwashing resources available online; Utilize social media, building television systems, and similar platforms to educate and encourage proper hygiene among students, staff, and the community. 4. Ensure adequate supplies (e.g., soap, paper towels, hand sanitizer, tissue) to support healthy hygiene practices. 5. Students in the elementary will be encouraged to wash hands upon entry and departure from school, at restroom breaks, and before and after lunch/snack.
<p>d. <u>Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation:</u></p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Schedules have been created so that all personnel are instructed on their areas of cleaning and the amount of time needed to address their areas of responsibility. 2. Daily disinfecting by custodians protocols include:

- a. Restroom handles,
 - b. doors handles,
 - c. sinks,
 - d. stair railings,
 - e. water bottle refilling handles,
 - f. office counters.
3. When a student is sent home with any COVID symptoms, the nurse will notify the principal and daylight custodian so student's learning area can be disinfected.
 4. Appropriate cleaning supplies (disinfecting spray and paper towels) will be made available in work spaces.
 5. Hand sanitizing stations will be available throughout all buildings.
 6. There will be a designated "well" and "sick" area within each nurse's office. Upon a student leaving a "sick" area, the nurse will allow for ventilation and appropriate time between students before the area will be cleaned.
 7. Limit sharing of high touch objects that are difficult to regularly clean (such as, electronic devices, pens, pencils, books, games, art supplies, lab equipment) to the greatest extent possible.
 8. Increase the introduction of outdoor air:
 - a. Open outdoor air dampers beyond minimum settings to reduce or eliminate HVAC air recirculation.
 - b. Open windows and doors, when weather conditions allow, to increase outdoor air flow.
 - c. Use fans to increase the effectiveness of open windows.
 - d. Ensure ventilation systems operate properly and provide acceptable indoor air quality for the current occupancy level for each space.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> e. Adjust HVAC systems to increase total airflow to occupied spaces when possible. f. Use portable high-efficiency particulate air (HEPA) fan/filtration systems to enhance air cleaning in higher risk areas such as a nurse’s office.
<p>e. <u>Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantining, in collaboration with the State and local health departments;</u></p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. If a student, staff, or visitor exhibits signs or symptoms of COVID-19 they will: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Notify the school nurse prior to sending /coming to the health office b. Be masked immediately c. Placed in isolated area d. Assessed after PPE applied by school nurse e. Parent/guardian will be called f. Student will be escorted to the car when parent arrives g. Siblings will be dismissed as well h. Parents will be advised to follow up with their PCP. A virtual visit may be set up while at the school or at home if the parent /guardian chooses. Parents will receive instructions on how this is conducted. 2. Utilize Bactronix spray when a person tests for COVID-19 in the bus and learning spaces he/she was in. 3. Refer to the most recent DOH guidance on home isolation or quarantine and returning to work/school. 4. The nurse will follow the screening tool which identifies the conditions related to a student’s return to school. 5. Nurse and administration will conduct contact tracing and recommend quarantine students/staff as appropriate.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none">6. Contact Rapid Response, PA DOH or CDC, as guided by current protocols. Collaborate with state health departments when investigating cases and exposures to COVID-19.7. Coordinate with PA Department of Education to ensure compliance with applicable laws related to privacy and the collection/sharing of this information as they undertake these activities.
<p>f. <u>Diagnostic and screening testing:</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">1. Parents/guardians are requested to screen their child for symptoms at home each morning before the school day.2. Parents will be asked to not send children with symptoms on a bus or brought to school.3. Temperature screening will not be required upon entrance to school for students or staff.4. Students and staff will consistently be made aware of the signs and symptoms of COVID-19.5. Students and staff will go to the nurse immediately if feeling symptomatic and will be placed in an isolation area.6. The District will share resources with the school community to help families understand when to keep children home.
<p>a. <u>Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities:</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">1. Partner with a local pharmacist or health care provider to offer a Vaccination Clinic for staff, students, and community members as per CDC guidelines, when possible. Follow CDC guidance on the need to offer a booster, if needed. Partner with Beaver Valley Intermediate Unit and local school districts to offer Vaccine Clinics.
<p>b. <u>Appropriate accommodations for students with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none">1. Life Skills, Emotional Support, Autistic Support and English Language Learner students will continue to receive face-to-face instruction, unless the school issues a school closure for weather, COVID, or other circumstances.2. Parents may choose to transition their child to a virtual environment.3. Support services may be held in-person or virtually.4. Students with complex needs will be addressed individually.

c. Coordination with state and local health officials.

1. HASD will follow the CDC and PA DOH guidelines and coordinate with state and local health officials as changes in protocols occur.
