

ecently in the United States, there is a resurfacing issue that has struck the country and struck hard. Since the 1990s, doctors have prescribed opioid pain relievers to patients due to surgery or chronic pain. Ever since they were readily available at the pharmacy patients have abused the drug prescribed to them.

In an article from drugsabuse.gov it states that 21 out of 29 will misuse the opioid prescribed to them.

In 2015 the epidemic hit the country harder than it ever did. More than 33,000 people died from overdosing on drugs. Now in 2018 it only seems to be getting worse with the statistics and deaths rising 10% a year. Whether it was a prescription opioid or a drug they had bought on the street. Overdose statistics have quadrupled since the 90s nearly killing 91 people a day.

Recently, a deadly drug has surfaced that has a tighter grip on people than heroin ever could. Along with the already terrifying crisis that hit this country, a new one is rising.

A drug that goes by the name of Flakka has become increasingly popular. Nicknamed the "zombie drug," police and EMT workers have also called it the "\$5 insanity" due to the way it affects the human body and how easily it can be bought. Its high is worse and more dangerous than any opioid combined.

Flakka causes the person who takes it to become extremely paranoid and act "inhuman" and psychotic. Police have reported that when a person on Flakka feels

threatened, they get a super human like strength that causes arresting and restraining extremely difficult.

The drug contains a form of an opioid called fentanyl which gives the body a feeling of drowsiness, euphoria, and lethargy. Doctors say it is 50 to 100 times more powerful than morphine administered in hospitals. People struggling with addiction and money issues will turn to easily accessible drugs such as Flakka because they are searching for that content feeling.

Even when addicts get clean from such drugs, the long term effects make their lives so much harder than it ever should have been. The damages done by these harmful opioids range from severe brain damage to collapsed veins to worst of all, death.

The people affected by these drugs and their families all agree, in the end, the drug abuse is not worth the damage it causes and they are not solutions to the problems in life.
