

Chassity's family mourns and held a ceremony on February 11th where pink and purple balloons were released into the sky so she can have her favorite colors with her at all times. They also placed Teddy bears because that was her favorite animal. They grieve in peace and pray for justice after losing a light of their lives. may Chassity rest in peace. Radioactive

magine you're at the peak of your athletic career, about to compete in an international sporting event. Then you get cancer.

Actually, maybe it's just nausea, disorientation, hair loss, weakness, fatigue, and excessive bleeding. Symptoms of radiation sickness. This year's summer Olympics will take place in Japan starting on July 24th through August 9th. Some activities, such as the Olympic Torch Relay Race, will take place in Fukushima, the site of a nuclear disaster. Could this be a problem?

Fukushima Daiichi, for those who don't know, was a nuclear power plant in Ōkuma, Fukushima. The power plant was hit by a massive tsunami wave 15 meters high that disabled the power supply and cooling of 3 Fukushima Daiichi reactors causing a nuclear accident on March 11, 2011. The accident was rated a 7 on the INES (International Nuclear Event Scale). Over 100,000 people were evacuated from their homes, and have still not returned to this day.

In regards to the radiation, a study published by the environmental group Greenpeace claims that radiation hotspots can still be detected in the Northeastern Fukushima prefecture, the exact location the 2020 Olympics Torch Relay will take place. «The radiation was found in a corner of a parking lot adjacent to the J-Village,» a deputy counselor at Japan>s Ministry of the Environment, Kishiko Yokoyama, said. «TEPCO is investigating why the high radiation level was found in that spot.» A radiated parking lot could be cause for concern, being that the unfortunate people who park there are at risk of getting sick. Japan's environment ministry said it had conducted further decontamination work and would enhance radiation monitoring at the stadium to ensure safety and the event's success.

"The Tokyo 2020 Games have become a goal for us to show the region has recovered," said Yasuki Sato, a Miyagi Prefecture official tasked with coordinating the preparations.

But while officials may be eager to continue the games, the residents of Fukushima are less thrilled. In an article about the effect of the Olympics on the evacuees written by Magdalena Osumi, one man who lost his house to the massive tsunami is skeptical about the Olympics being good for the town's recovery. "Cheering the victims through sports is a good idea," says Setsuo Takahashi. "But the Olympics have nothing to do with the people who live here. It's a different world, unreachable for us." It has also been said that preparations are taking precedence over the reconstruction of the prefecture; so perhaps the people do have cause for concern.

How would you feel, as an evacuee who's been waiting for 9 years and is now a second thought? How would you feel as a participant of the competition? Would you feel safe? Given all the issues currently surrounding Japan, regarding the disaster prefectures alone, maybe it's not quite a good idea to hold the 2020 Olympics there. While raising awareness for Fukushima and showing that the nation has recovered sounds good, maybe the Olympics just isn't the right platform to use.



The Zodiac Killer

The zodiac killings took place in Northern California from the late 1960's to the early 1970's. He murdered victims in Benicia, Vallejo, Napa County, and San Francisco. The Zodiac Killer claimed to have killed 37 victims, while police only had evidence of five. He attacked four men and three women, though two of those men survived. This killer got his name from his taunting letters he sent to the Bay Area Press. These letters included four cryptograms, which are a type of puzzle. Only one of the four were solved. This cipher was solved by a high school teacher and it read "I like killing people because it is so much fun" "it is more fun than killing wild game in the forest, because man is the most dangerous

animal of all." One of his letters read "Dear editor: I am the killer of the two teenagers last Christmas at lake Herman. Each of his letters contained a symbol of a circle with a cross through it. A man named Arthur Allen was a potential suspect based on "circumstantial evidence." There were reports of Arthur claiming he wanted to kill people. In 2010 all evidence against him turned out negative. The Zodiac Killer still remains anonymous. San Francisco police marked the case 'inactive" but reopened it in 2007. The case also remains open in Vallejo, Napa County, and Solano County. These cases originally opened in 1969. The Zodiac Killer even inspired movie creators in films like Dirty Harry.



Women's History Month

ary Ruthsdotter, Molly Murphy MacGregor, Maria Cuveas, Paula Hammett, and Bette Morgan are the names of the amazing women who co-founded the National Women's History Project together. These women would go on to do astounding things with their lives, including help establish National Women's History Month, which happens to take place in the month of March. Even though when you think of March you usually think of shamrocks and leprechauns, this month is about so much more. It consists of history about the excellent women of our country who changed things for everybody throughout the years.

Women officially started protesting and referred to as "stepping out of line" in the mid-1800's. They were enraged due to low pay and poor working conditions while garment working. Garment work was dangerous and often involved child labor, and the marches caused by these conditions was said to have started the uprising of protests and of America's labor movement. After years of marches, women finally decided that March was the perfect month to celebrate women's history in America. But, most women didn't feel like they had a voice due to no one ever truly speaking up before, and then came a female activist and history teacher, Molly Murphy MacGregor. In 1978, she and fellow members of the Education Task Force of the Sonoma County Commission instituted a local "Women's History Week". During this short but sweet event, schools and organizations celebrated women's achievements in specially created curriculums, there was even a small parade hosted.

Then in 1979, MacGregor teamed up with academic historian Gerda Lerner at Sarah Lawernce college to produce a 17 day conference on women's history and its influence towards the public. This attracted a ton of media attention from the press. Nevertheless all the struggles, Molly Murphy MacGregor established the National Women's History Project in 1980 along side her fellow co-founders and activists. With this association, people finally started to recognize and take more action on women's rights, and the unfairness upon them. But, these powerful group of ladies were not done just yet, the group enlisted help in Democratic Representative Barbara Mikluski. Moreover, in that same year, President Carter declared the week of 2-8

March "Women's History Week." The organization worked extremely hard at the state level before 14 states across the U.S. started celebrating this festivity through the whole month of March. Moreover, this occurrence changed the way colleges and public schools taught their history lessons to their students. At that point, state governments themselves started to lobby heavily for it to be a national event, and finally, in 1987, they seceded! One of the biggest accomplishments for the female community.

Even though this national celebration is only 33 years old this year, it is still another reason why March is such an important month. But, women have been working,marching, and protesting for their rights for over 100 years! From working at home and sewing, to becoming doctors and politicians, the female community has grown immensely over the years. And we should thank our ancestors for this amazing celebration in this "lucky" month.
