It's Not Cool to Vape in School

ver been in the bathroom at school, and suddenly, the restroom starts smelling like a fruit basket? There's only two things that could be happening: someone's having a fruit feast in the bathroom, or they're vaping.

Due to the increase in students vaping in bathrooms, Dr. Kartychak has decided to install vape detectors in our school restrooms.

Through the course of the 2022-2023 school year, Hopewell applied for a grant for vape detectors, and the grant was given. Each individual detector costed around \$1,200, and the grant money covered the cost of all of them, with some extra money to improve security around school.

"The vape detectors detect the chemicals that are released from vapes. They can detect those chemicals versus if someone sprayed Axe or deodorant in a restroom," said Dr. Kartychak, Hopewell High School's Principal. Dr. Kartychak said the devices will resemble smoke detectors.

Dr. Kartychak also discussed the consequences of getting caught vaping. The first offense is three days of TOC and a citation. With a second or third offense the consequences increase, as does the fine. The punishment if CBD is detected in a vape will escalate the punishment for even a single offense including up to 10 days out-of-school suspension, enlistment in a substance abuse program, as well as a citation, or even expulsion.

Some students are fed up with vapers as well. Junior Dan Earley said, "There are designated 'vape bath-

rooms' around the school, and if you don't want to breathe that stuff in, then you have to walk all the way across the school to find another bathroom, so I think it's a good idea to install the vape detectors." He hopes the vape detectors will make Hopewell a little better place.

Vape detectors are coming soon to a Hopewell High School bathroom near you, and bathrooms will be smelling a little bit less fruity.





It's Still a Great Day to be a Viking

r. Allison was born to educate. The oldest of three brothers, a lifeguard, swim instructor, coach, and eventually principal, it was always clear that his true passion lay in teaching. Whether by the works of God or through the urge to help and impact the lives of others, "I always viewed this responsibility of teaching as my vocation," said Mr. Allison.

After 35 years in education, Mr. Allison has had a lot of powerful moments. But even more than that, he has empowered multiple classes of young people. As he spends his days trapped at home, recovering from foot surgery, he reflects on his years as an educator.

Beginning his teaching career at South Side Junior High School as a science teacher, Mr. Allison felt at home in the classroom. Connecting with young kids and impacting their lives eventually led him to take on an

even bigger responsibility of becoming the coach of the Boy's and Girl's Junior High Basketball teams, and the Girl's Varsity Basketball team.

His years as a teacher never left his mind, even when he became the Assistant Principal of Hopewell High School on March 1, 1998. Full of confidence and ambition, "I walked in on Monday morning ready to roll full of energy and feeling like I knew it all," admitted Mr. Allison. He quickly realized that he, "surely did not know it all."

Hopewell High School was very different in 1998 than it is in 2023. There were unlocked doors and no security cameras. Dr. Frioni was the principal and the school had about 1050 students, more than two times the students Hopewell High School has today. Or as Mr. Allison put it, "two times the number of kids, two times the number of problems."

Yet, Mr. Allison did not let

the challenges halt his career and love for teaching, eventually becoming the principal of Hopewell High School less than two years after coming to Hopewell.

His 35 years as an educator have proved to consist of tons of good times, too many to count. Celebrating successes and overcoming adversity with students and staff was one of the most rewarding things Mr. Allison cherished about working in education.

"Ultimately, graduation is the best day for any high school teacher," noted Mr. Allison. The best day of his career as principal was at the graduation ceremony of the class of 2017. Maria Skeriotis, the salutatorian of the class of 2017, asked Mr. Allison to deliver her graduation speech. Maria was one of the most determined students in Hopewell High School, despite experiencing health challenges that made it hard for her to be able to speak loudly for long periods of time.

"Being her voice that special day and sharing her wisdom with her classmates was a privilege that words cannot describe. Having Maria in my life and as a friend is a true gift, I thank her for that opportunity."

With good times comes challenging times, and for Mr. Allison the most challenging day of his career was the March 29th swatting incident. He is most proud of the efforts of the students, staff, and community to cooperate and rally together.

Mr. Allison's last day as principal, July 31, 2023, was peaceful. No teachers or students were present, allowing him to enjoy his final day uninterrupted. He was incredibly honored and even teared up when Mr. Keiper brought the band to the office parking

lot to play one last song. A small cake and celebration with the office staff was the perfect conclusion to his final day.

"I walked out quietly and without fanfare just the way I wanted it," said Mr. Allison.

Retirement hasn't been a luxurious paradise for Mr. Allison, as foot surgery has left him unable to drive and put weight on his foot, but he does miss his days at Hopewell.

"Actually, I kind of feel the void already! I miss the interactions, friendships, and relationships that have developed." He is looking forward to the days ahead of him when he can return to the school on occasion and interact with the students and staff.

Mr. Allison hopes "It's a Great







Day to be a Viking!" remains in the school. "It represents everything we do in the school," noted Mr. Allison.

His last message for the community is, "I sincerely want to thank everyone who over the years made Hopewell High School a great place to teach and learn and a special place for me." Twenty-six years at Hopewell composed of incredible memories, great staff, special students, and a Viking community, will follow Mr. Allison long into retirement.

Even though you may not hear him laughing in the hallways or see him joking around with Mr. Short, he is still here. His legacy remains in the school through Viking Pride, the "It's a Great Day to be a Viking" sign, and everything else that has become the norm at Hopewell High School. Mr. Allison's impact will live on in the Viking community and will continue to influence the lives of Hopewell students forever.

n September 12th, members of our Hopewell School Board met to discuss future changes and issues in our district.

The most pressing issue brought up at the meeting was a bullying incident that took place at the Jr. High School. A mother gave a statement on an incident of roughhousing and pushing of her two sons after a soccer practice, claiming that minimal action was taken on behalf of the district to discourage further activity.

She then spoke about how difficult it was to find the bullying code of conduct on the school website. Her most formal worry was when she discovered that the conduct on bullying

was extremely outdated. "It was published in 2008... the cyberbullying guidelines were made in 2013."

The mother suggested a solution to these issues by making the school website easier to navigate, and updating the bullying policies of all Hopewell schools.

In response, the head of the board meeting responded with how it was, "Difficult to change" and "a gray area" under which many things could slip through the cracks. It is currently unclear if they will consider a new bullying policy or not.

Board Members also voted to allow the hiring of two new teachers at the Jr. High School, one of which being a part-time art teacher. They also decided to go through with a "technology update" at the end of September.

All Board Meetings are open to the public, and all transcripts and video recordings can be found on the school website. There are also zoom meetings that are open to the public, links to which are provided upon request, on the school website as well! Participating in the community Board Meetings is the best way to bring change and improve our school quickly, so stop by and speak your mind! uperstar Taylor Swift is no stranger to putting on a good show. Her famous Eras Tour broke many records and left fans speechless.

After not being able to go on tour for three years due to COVID, Swift surprised fans when announcing the Eras Tour on November 1st via social media.

Her setlist is what ultimately shocked many. Swift decided to perform songs from all of her "eras". The show opened with the song "Miss Americana and the Heartbreak Prince" from her album Lover. She followed that with popular songs, "Cruel Summer", "You Need to Calm Down", "The Man" and "Lover".

Going back in time to 2008, she sang songs such as "You Belong With Me" and "Love Story" from her second album Fearless.

Following this, she sang as many as seven songs from each album, making the concert a total of four hours.

In those four hours, the most anticipated part of the show is what Swift calls the "acoustic section of the night" and fans call "the surprise songs". During every show Swift performs two songs, one being played on guitar and the other on piano, that were not on the setlist.

Here in Pittsburgh during her first show she sang "Mr. Perfectly Fine", a vault track from her album Fearless, and "The Last Time" from her album Red. The second night she sang "The Story of Us", from the album Speak Now and "Seven", from Folklore.

Along with surprising Pittsburgh with four great songs, she also broke the attendance record at

Acrisure Stadium on the first night she was there. With 73,117 fans in attendance, this marks the stadium's largest crowd ever.

Not only did Swift break records in Pittsburgh, on opening night in Glendale, Arizona she broke the record for the most-attended concert by a female artist ever. Her tour is estimated to become one of the highest grossing tours of all time.

Along with that, Swift recently announced that a movie regarding her tour that will be released in theaters on October 13th. This two hour and forty-five minute long film will follow Swift as she preforms during her six night run at Sofi Stadium in California.

During ticket presale, according to Variety Magazine, the film has earned 26 million dollars. This set a single day record, topping

Marvel's popular "Spider-Man: No Way Home". This record breaking film is highly awaited by all fans.

October couldn't come sooner for Swifties. Not only is the Eras Tour film coming out, but also 1989 (Taylor's Version) will be out on October 27th, 2023. During her last show on the first leg of the U.S. tour, Swift announced her version of 1989.

This isn't the first time Swift has surprised fans with a new album while on tour. On her first night in Nashville, May 5th, Swift announced *Speak Now (Taylor's Version)*, it came out this summer on July 7th.


Starting in April 2021 Taylor Swift worked to own her own albums. In April she started her journey by re-releasing her second album *Fearless*. Followed by *Red* and *Speak Now*. Swift began this process of re-recording her music because back in 2019 Swift's old record label got sold to Scooter



Braun. This means that anytime Swift's song was used in a TV show, movie, or commercial Braun would get paid. Swift did not agree with this, hence the whole re-recording process.

There are still more surprises to come! The Eras Tour continues until 2024. With many international shows and even fifteen more
